

Getting to the House and Hotel

The President's House is a beautifully preserved Victorian home located at 231 Viking Drive SW, Valley City, ND 58072, on the campus of Valley City State University. It was built in 1901, and from 1921-1993 served as the home for the VCSU Presidents and their families.

The GrandStay Hotel and Suites is modern with excellent conference facilities. Located at 271 Winter Show Rd SW, Valley City, ND 58072, it is only a couple of minutes from the President's House.

Getting to and around Valley City

Valley City (with a population of approximately 6,500) is located on I-94, about 35 miles east of Jamestown and about 60 miles west of Fargo. Recently, Valley City was named the most beautiful town in North Dakota by Expedia Travel. The nearest airport is at Jamestown, which is served by United Airlines. Fargo has additional flights. A Brief History of Valley City

Valley City, seat (1879) of Barnes County, lies in the Sheyenne River Valley. Before settlement, Cheyenne, Sioux, Cree, and Ojibwa Indians hunted in the area. The community was founded in 1872 with the coming of the Northern Pacific Railway. Originally called Worthington, it was renamed and incorporated as a village in 1881. Valley City, located in a fertile agricultural region that produces sunflowers, wheat, barley, corn (maize), and soybeans, developed as an agricultural trade center. Manufactures include farm machinery, electronics, plastics, and cement. Food processing and telemarketing are also important to the economy. The city is the seat of Valley City State University (founded 1890). Baldhill Dam, a flood-control project on the Sheyenne River north of the city, impounds Lake Ashtabula (site of a federal fish hatchery). The North Dakota Winter Show, an agricultural event, is held annually in March. Camp Sheardown State Historic Site, marking a campsite for an 1863 expedition, is just east of the city. Fort Ransom State Park is 35 miles south. The city is known for its many bridges over the Sheyenne River including the Hi-Line Railroad Bridge. These bridges have earned it the distinction of being called the "City of Bridges".

Hospitality

Hospitality food and drink will be set up in the dining room of the President's House as well as the conference room of the GrandStay Hotel. We have no restrictions on bringing food and drink into either venue. Primary hospitality hours will be from 1:00 pm until 11:00 pm on Friday at the President's House (with some offerings at the hotel conference room), 9:00 am until 1:30 pm on Saturday at the hotel conference room and 1:30 pm until 11:00 pm on Saturday at the President's House (with some offerings at the hotel conference room). The GrandStay hotel will provide all guests with breakfast on Saturday and Sunday. Dinner on Friday as well as lunch and dinner on Saturday are included in your registration fee. We will have several delivery or take out options from local restaurants. And for those who wish to cook or bake, the President's House has a fully equipped kitchen.

Games will be available both at the President's House and our hotel conference room. You are also encouraged to bring any of your own that you like.

7:00 pm – 9:00 pm – We shall visit Medicine Wheel Park, directly behind the President’s House. In 1992 at Valley City State University, Professor Joe Stickler and his students began work on Medicine Wheel Park. The project soon expanded beyond the walls of the classroom to involve the community. The Park features two solar calendars: A horizon calendar (the medicine wheel) and a meridian or noontime calendar. Other aspects of this unique 30-acre Park include Native American burial mounds, a solar system model, the North Country National Scenic Trail and other woodland nature trails, several scenic overlooks of the Sheyenne River valley and Valley City, and a 3000 square foot perennial flower garden. Explore the Valley City Area

In addition to our planned activities, we offer some additional options you may wish to consider.

Valley City Historic Bridges Tour -- Explore North Dakota’s “City of Bridges.” Valley City is proud of its beautiful and historic bridges. A tour has been created to showcase them. Enjoy the beautiful color interpretive panels located by eight bridges throughout the city that tell the unique story of each bridge. Valley City

Bridges Volksmarch is a 10k (6.25 mile) walk which begins at the Broken Spoke Restaurant on the corner of Main Street and Central Avenue. The trail is on city sidewalks and pathways. It features several bridges, Valley City State University, the Barnes County Museum, parks and the business district. The Valley City Bridges Walk is sanctioned by the American Volkssport Association (AVA), a member of the International Federations of Popular Sports (IVV) and counts toward achieving IVV awards. Visit Red Trail Vineyard – About 30 miles east of Valley City, the Red Trail Vineyard is named after the historically significant Old Red Trail, one of the first established routes for automobile travel through the northern part of the United States. It stretched from Seattle, WA to New York, NY and passed just on the north side of the Vineyard. Through the years, many Native American artifacts have been found near the Vineyard and along the Old Red Trail, some of which are on display in the Tasting Room at Red Trail Vineyard. The fertile soils of the Red River Valley and traditional wine making techniques combine to elicit the subtle flavors and aromas of the native hybrid grapes. Visit the Ronald Reagan Minuteman Missile Site – About 50 miles north of Valley City, the Ronald Reagan Minuteman Missile State Historic Site actually consists of two sites telling the story of the Cold War years in North Dakota. They are the Oscar-Zero Missile Alert Facility and the November-33 Launch Facility. They are the last remnants of the 321st Missile Wing, a cluster of intercontinental ballistic missile launch sites that were spread over a 6,500-squaremile area around the Grand Forks Air Force Base. The Oscar Zero Launch Control Center and the November-33 Missile Facility played an integral part in the Cold War in North Dakota and the world. This site is the last launch control center intact with the top-side of November 33 missile facility.
